The All-American is an exciting race held each August in Akron, Ohio. By winning your local Derby race you could be one of the 250 Champions who race their cars down "the big hill" in front of 70,000 cheering spectators. The entire week in Akron is full of fun and action, with parades, celebrities and parties. All the Champions stay at a special camp where there's swimming, boating, horseback riding and many other great things to do.

\$30,000 IN SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The All-American Champion in Akron receives a Chevrolet \$7,500 college scholarship, plus the First Place Trophy and the thrill of winning the "big race." Champions who finish second through ninth also receive college scholarships and trophies. Special trophies are also awarded for best brake, best design, best construction and best upholstery.

In order to win the trip to Akron for the All-American you must win your hometown Soap Box Derby race. Local races, too, are full of fun and excitement and are an important event in your town. Each local Champion receives a \$500 Savings Bond from Chevrolet, and locally a number of other awards and prizes. But the greatest award is the thrill of building your own Soap Box Derby car, then racing it yourself against other boys.

Major, U. S. Army. Former All-American back for Army, Heisman Trophy winner, Rhodes Scholar and decorated soldier. Also former Soap Box Derby racer from Royal Oak, Michigan.


SIGN UP WITH YOUR CHEVROLET DEALER


